TRAFFIC SHIFT SCHEDULED ON REAGAN MEMORIAL TOLLWAY (I-88) FOR ONGOING BRIDGE REPAIRS OVER THE UNION PACIFIC RAILROAD IN DEKALB

Traffic will shift onto the newly reconstructed westbound bridge, remain reduced to one lane in each direction on I-88 through late fall

DOWNERS GROVE, IL – Traffic the Reagan Memorial Tollway (I-88) is scheduled to shift this week from the eastbound side onto the westbound side of the bridge over the Union Pacific Railroad in DeKalb. Traffic will continue to be reduced to one lane in each direction to accommodate construction.

Electronic message signs and construction signage are in place in advance to alert drivers to the lane closures and traffic shifts scheduled throughout the work. Up-to-date closure information will be available on the Illinois Tollway's [Daily Construction Alert](#). All work is weather dependent.

Beginning Wednesday, July 30, work will begin to shift I-88 traffic onto the newly reconstructed westbound side of the bridge and create a work zone on the eastbound side of the bridge. The shift will take two nights to complete. Traffic will remain reduced to one lane in each direction and is scheduled to remain in this configuration through late fall.

The traffic shift and lane reductions will allow the Tollway to safely accommodate traffic while repairs are underway on the I-88 bridge over the Union Pacific Railroad. Repairs include bridge deck, parapet, abutment and approach slab repairs, as well as bridge joint work and pavement and shoulder repairs.

Lane closures are being coordinated with the Union Pacific Railroad, as well as local fire and police departments.

In 2025, the Illinois Tollway work on the Reagan Memorial Tollway (I-88) will include repairs to the mainline bridge over the Union Pacific Railroad in DeKalb and corridor-wide pavement repairs, as well as the completion of the York Road Bridge reconstruction over the ramps connecting eastbound I-88 to southbound I-294 and northbound I-294 to westbound I-88 in Oak Brook. This work is part of the Tollway's 16-year, \$15 billion capital program, *Move Illinois: The Illinois Tollway Driving the Future*.

Work Zone Safety

Construction zone speed limits are in effect in all construction zones 24/7 and drivers should continue to watch for changing traffic patterns and use caution, especially when workers are present. On I-88, a 45 mph work zone speed limit is in effect throughout the construction season.

The Illinois Tollway reminds motorists that the "Move Over Law" requires motorists to change lanes or to slow down and proceed with caution when passing any vehicle on the side of the road with hazard lights activated. If you see flashing lights ahead, please move over or slow down.

Illinois State Police have zero tolerance for drivers speeding in work zones or failure to comply with the Move Over Law. The minimum penalty for speeding in a work zone is \$250 with up to a \$25,000 fine

and a 14-year jail sentence for hitting a roadway worker. Penalties for failure to slow down or move over for a vehicle on the shoulder with flashing lights include up to a \$10,000 fine, 2-year suspension of driving privileges and jail time, in extreme cases.

About *Move Illinois*

The Illinois Tollway's 16-year, \$15 billion capital program, *Move Illinois: The Illinois Tollway Driving the Future*, is improving mobility, relieving congestion, reducing pollution, creating as many as 165,220 jobs and linking economies throughout the region. The first 13 years of *Move Illinois* are on schedule and within budget, delivering the new Illinois Route 390 Tollway and a rebuilt and widened Jane Addams Memorial Tollway (I-90) with its new SmartRoad corridor, as well as opening a new interchange connecting the Tri-State Tollway (I-294) to I-57. Progress continues on projects addressing the remaining needs of the existing Tollway system, delivering the new I-490 Tollway Project and reconstruction of the Central Tri-State Tollway (I-294).

The Illinois Tollway is a user-fee system that receives no state or federal funds for maintenance and operations. The agency maintains and operates 294 miles of roadways in 12 counties in Northern Illinois, including the Reagan Memorial Tollway (I-88), the Veterans Memorial Tollway (I-355), the Jane Addams Memorial Tollway (I-90), the Tri-State Tollway (I-94/I-294/I-80) and the Illinois Route 390 Tollway.
